"mandala"- a Sanskrit word meaning "circle"


Used as an object for visual meditation in many religions and cultures.










Mandala Outlines

- 2. Select the glass for your mandala
- 3. Transfer your outline onto the glass using a permanent marker
- 4. Cut, grind, and clean your glass
